

Dear All,

Many Christian denominations around the world mark the season of Epiphany through the tradition of 'chalking the door' using a pattern such as the one above. The numbers represent the calendar year 2024 and the crosses represent Christ. The letters C, M, and B in some traditions stand for the names of the biblical magi (Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar) and in other traditions represent the Latin blessing *Christus Mansionem Benedicat* (May Christ Bless this House). Chalking the door is commonly done on Epiphany Day itself, although it can be done on any day of the Epiphany Season. Chalking the door is an invitation for the Risen Christ to be a daily guest in our home — in our comings and our goings, in our conversations and our actions, in our work and our play, in our joys and our sorrows.

Traditionally the season of Epiphany is about celebrating and discovering the ways in which God reveals God's own self and God's own nature to us. As such we are reminded to keep ourselves open to the presence of God in our daily lives. The mistake that many of us make is that we expect to see God's presence revealed to us in dramatic and spectacular ways – like many of the accounts we read in the bible. However, we would

do well to remember that our brothers and sisters in the Roman Catholic Church call this season Ordinary Time rather than the season of Epiphany. It is an important reminder to us that God's presence is frequently found in the ordinariness of our everyday lives, in the simplest of actions, and in the routine interactions we have with others.

I hope that you receive Christ as a daily guest in your home this season and that you experience something of God's presence in your daily life.

We received this letter from Mia, whom we welcomed to our church while she was studying in Edinburgh

15th of December, 2023

Dear church,

As you may know, I'm already back in Barcelona. But I did want to say goodbye and thank you all for welcoming me into your community!

These past two years have been everything but dull. On the one hand, it has been an intense (and stressful!) time as I was nearing the end of my PhD, which deals with cultural trauma and the tradition of the empty tomb in Mark 16:1-8. "Cultural trauma" refers to how groups, communities or collectives deal with events that are deemed so traumatic that they are able to unravel what holds the group together. In other words, they profoundly impact social or collective identity. Traumatic and horrendous events, like Iesus' crucifixion, demand that a group unfolds different strategies to make sense of the trauma and avoid falling apart. Ritual lamentation, by which we mean ancient rituals to honour the dearly departed at the time of death and beyond, is particularly effective in this endeavour. The latter, we can see in Mark 16: the women travelling to Jesus' tomb to mourn and lament are not alone but embody the whole community of early Jesus' followers coming to terms with Jesus' death and its meaning(s). My research spotlights how women had a pivotal role during these rituals and were deeply involved in producing a social memory of Jesus, for in death, we look back to the life of an individual.

On the other hand, my work with the Gospel of Mark has pushed me well beyond the collective sense of trauma, and I have also explored the connections between individual and collective trauma, particularly in the Church. Consequently, I have dwelt in the realities of religious trauma, spiritual abuse and spiritual violence. At times, this diving has been challenging to navigate: the Church's witnessing of the Gospel and personal biographies are frequently revisited when dealing with these realities, and it may be a painful experience.

Places affording the opportunity to catch up with oneself are particularly healthy in these processes, and though I'm afraid I have been a bit of a silent visitor in Pilrig's St Paul, being welcomed in the community and joining in worship with you all has been anything but a silent experience for me.

I would be remiss if I didn't also express my gratitude to the Church of Scotland: I could come and study at New College thanks to the Faithshare Programme, a project spearheaded by the World Mission Council of the Church of Scotland, today the Faith Action Programme. I cannot emphasise enough the importance and the impactful difference this programme has in enabling international students like myself to pursue theological education, and give back the results of their work to the broader community of churches. As I write this, I'm preparing to move to Mexico in a couple of months, where I will be joining a theological programme as a lecturer in New Testament. I also expect to connect with some church partners with the Church of Scotland, like the Comunión Mexicana de Iglesias Presbiterianas y Reformadas (CMIR).

As we prepare for Christmas, and the roads fill with those fortunate enough to make their way back home to celebrate with family and friends, it is fitting to think how the shortest of encounters have the power to change one's life's direction. Even more, that encounter might be the little light, the final push capturing God's blessing in a caring hug those venturing into the unknown may need.
